

Prep - Term 2 Overview

In term 3 we also welcome Lisa Gillson to our Prep Team - Lisa is teaching P17. We are all excited to hear Miss Bree's news coming soon!

Literacy

For Reading this term Preps will focus on examining books and stories. Students will answer questions about texts we read and have discussions about connections they can make to books. Students will be learning about the difference between facts and made up stories to help them identify narrative and informative texts. Practising sight words will continue to be an important part of our reading lessons to assist students to read fluently and with expression. Students will also continue to develop reading fluency by participating in daily speed reads and learning to read with a partner.

In Phonics, we will be introducing the concept that every word has at least one vowel sound and that words can be broken into syllables. We will also introduce consonant digraphs, like sh, ch and th. Children will learn to identify the letters that make these sounds, and apply their understanding by reading and writing words with these digraphs.

In Writing, Preps will have a go at generating and writing a sentence independently, using picture prompts. We will also continue to extend their writing skills to include more than one sentence with teacher guidance. They will be reminded to always include finger spaces between words, use a capital letter at the beginning of sentences and for names and a full stop at the end. Students will learn about writing recounts using sentence starters 'first' 'next, 'then' and 'finally'. Later in the term we will be celebrating Book Week, by reading some of the shortlisted books released by the Children's Book Council. Children will participate in activities to celebrate Book Week.



Numeracy

In Number, students will continue to develop their skills in working with numbers from 0-99. Using this knowledge, students will build on their understanding of representing numbers as groups of tens and ones. They will also be introduced to the 'teen' numbers. Students will be introduced to addition, subtraction and sharing objects (the foundations of division). In Measurement, students will consolidate their knowledge of days of the week, comparing and ordering daily events, such as first we eat breakfast, next we go to school.



Topic :Our community and it's helpers

This term we are learning about our local community and the members within it who help to keep us safe and healthy. Throughout the term we will be visited by community members such as police, firefighters and St. John's ambulance. Together we will explore places in our local community through the use of technology. We will also visit Shaxton Circle and Witternberg Reserve on our community walk at the end of Term.







How can I support my child's learning at home?



Please continue your home learning routines daily.

Read aloud to your child: We encourage parents/carers to read with their child regularly, this allows them to be exposed to books they are interested in.

Take Home Reading: Encourage your child to practise their sight words, letter names and sounds in their home learning book. Your child can then implement these skills by reading their decodable book every day.

TERM 3 - OVERVIEW

YEAR 1

Welcome to Term 3 2025.

We are looking forward to a successful, productive and exciting term in Year 1.

English

In **Reading**, Year 1 students will be exploring strategies to develop their comprehension skills such as predicting, making connections, summarising, and questioning whilst reading decodable texts. Through the exploration of 'Fairy Tales', students will explore how authors use images and sounds in different types of texts to create meaning. They will also learn how to adapt imaginative texts with 'Fractured Fairytales' and talk about and compare the plot, characters and settings in different stories.

In **Writing**, students will be introduced to poetry and explore repetition, rhyme and rhythm in simple poems. They will listen to, recite and discuss poems and their featured sound patterns such as alliteration. This term, students will also begin to correctly use full stops, exclamation marks and question marks and use capital letters for proper nouns in their writing.

In **Speaking and Listening**, students will learn the difference between open and closed questions, statements, requests and commands and will explore how to ask 'when', 'where' and 'how' questions during discussions. This term, students will also learn how to bring a story to life through performances in Reader's Theatre.

In **Phonics**, students will continue to build on their knowledge of long vowel and r-controlled vowel sounds. Students will learn to read, write and spell words with these sounds. We will continue to study morphology (investigating the parts of words / compound words) by looking at different suffixes, and how they affect the meaning of a word.

Please remind your child to bring in their Take Home Reading Bags and to change their books at school on Monday and Thursday each week. We encourage parents to read with their child daily.

Numeracy

In **Number** this term, Year 1 students will focus on sharing collections into equal groups using place-value and skip counting. They will use mathematical modelling, diagrams, physical and virtual materials and calculation strategies to solve real-life problems by sharing and grouping things equally.

In **Measurement**, students will learn how to measure the length of shapes and objects using informal units and understand that informal units must be uniform and used end-to-end to measure an object. Students will learn how to use comparative language to compare and order the length, mass and capacity of objects as well as the duration of events using informal units.

In **Space**, students will explore how to use directional language to move people and objects to different places within a space.

In **Statistics**, students will investigate how to collect and record data in different ways including; using digital tools, objects, drawings, lists, tally marks and symbols.

We encourage parents to support their children to understand division by sharing things equally at home. Using maths in real life situations, for example, using small amounts of money at shops and working out change, weighing items when cooking, etc.





Inquiry Topic - Past & Present (Juniors)



The Junior School Inquiry Topic for term three is 'Past & Present'. Our Junior students will explore how life has changed over time. We'll be looking closely at how the past compares to the present by investigating changes in transportation, music, toys, education, and everyday life. This includes exploring money, clothing, cooking, and photos to see how things were done in the past.

Throughout the unit, our Junior students will ask questions, examine old and new objects, and practise putting events in order. They'll begin to understand why these things are important in the creation of newer inventions, and will share their learning through drawings, timelines and simple stories.

TERM 3 - OVERVIEW

YEAR 2



Welcome to Term 3 2025. We are looking forward to a successful, productive and exciting term in Year 2.

English

In **Reading and Viewing** during NAIDOC Week and throughout the term, Year 2 students will explore chants, rhymes or songs from other cultures and how characters belong in specific settings using texts by a variety of authors and illustrators, including Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders. In their poetry unit later in the term students will describe and compare the features of poetry in shape, free verse and haiku poems. In their 'Fairy Tales' unit, students will build on known texts by experimenting with character, setting and plots.

In **Writing**, students will understand how to use pronouns to replace common and proper nouns when they construct simple and complex sentences. Using their knowledge of prefixes and suffixes, students will explore how to build word families. Students will continue to build on how to use capital letters in titles and commas to list ideas in sentences.

In **Speaking and Listening**, students will be exploring how to plan for addressing an audience as they will be completing an oral presentation connecting to our topic, 'Past and Present'. This project will be a joint research project between home and school. Students will also learn how to read aloud with expression during our Reader's Theatre unit.

In **Phonics**, now that Year 2 students have completed the DRA program they will be building on their knowledge and skills of these sounds and applying them during reading and writing activities. They will focus on developing their oral language skills by applying the sounds they have learnt and using spelling rules to spell words correctly and further their understanding of word parts (morphology).

Students will be taught strategies to develop their comprehension skills such as predicting, summarising, visualising and questioning skills using a variety of activities.

Inquiry Topic - Past & Present (Juniors)

The Junior School Inquiry Topic for term three is 'Past & Present'. Our Junior students will explore how life has changed over time. We'll be looking closely at how the past compares to the present by investigating changes in transportation, music, toys, education, and everyday life. This includes exploring money, clothing, cooking, and photos to see how things were done in the past.

Throughout the unit, our Junior students will ask questions, examine old and new objects, and practise putting events in order. They'll begin to understand why these things are important in the creation of newer inventions, and will share their learning through drawings, timelines and simple stories.

Numeracy

In **Number** this term, Year 2 students will focus on multiplication, division (sharing evenly) and fractions. Students will be exposed to various strategies to learn these skills such as using groups of arrays, repeated addition and partitioning to solve problems. In **Measurement**, students will explore how to measure and compare the length of objects using appropriate informal units. Students will continue to develop strategies to solve worded problems representing practical situations.

We encourage parents to support their children to understand these concepts by practicing times tables, quick multiplication and division number facts at home and using maths in real life situations. This may look like students assisting with money at the shops to work out change and measuring household items.



MIDDLES - TERM 3 OVERVIEW

We look forward to an exciting term of learning and fun in Middles.

This term students will be celebrating Book Week "Books and Adventure" and participating in St Johns First Aid incursion. Students' learning will be consolidated through daily reading and spelling practice at home. As we begin to look more closely at multiplication and division, students will greatly benefit from being able to automatically recall their multiplication facts (times tables).

MIDDLES ENGLISH

For writing in term three, students will continue to learn how to plan, draft and publish persuasive texts using paragraphs (including the use of digital technologies). Utilising language features, including those from indigenous cultures, they will explore and create multimodal texts. Students will explore old and contemporary versions of stories and draw on ideas from these stories to rewrite and create their own imaginative version. They will also investigate many forms of figurative language and poetry and create a digital book with original poems. Students will continue to build on their knowledge of word origins and more challenging vocabulary. The Traits of Writing, which includes Voice, Ideas, Presentations, Conventions, Organisation, Word Choice and Sentence Fluency, will be fully utilised in all units of writing to improve the writing proficiency of students.

This term in reading, students will work in reading groups where they will continue to build their skills and knowledge of 'within the text', 'beyond the text' and 'about the text' reading comprehension strategies. Student's will develop a range of strategies to read and use more complex words by sounding out and chunking. They will identify the effect that different elements (illustrations, photos, fonts) in texts have on an audience and identify purpose, features, structure and the intended audience of different text types, including online texts. Using mentor texts such as Jackie French's series, students will discuss how figurative language (similes, metaphors, onomatopoeia, idioms and personification) are used to enhance meaning and shape the reader's reaction

Students will continue with weekly Spelling lessons to support them in building letter-sound knowledge and their ability to apply their spelling knowledge in daily writing. They will continue looking at 'r-controlled vowels', moving into less common spelling choices such as; 'tch' and 'dge' and finishing off the term with 'hard c' and 'soft c' sounds. They will also be learning about morphology (parts of words) by exploring how words change when a suffix (-er, -est, -ous, -able, -ible) is added.

MENTOR TEXTS





Year 4 MATHEMATICS

In term three in number students will continue to build their automatic recall of multiplication and related division facts for twos, threes, fives and tens. Students will practise and be able to recall multiplication facts up to 10×10 and related division facts. They will continue to formulate and solve simple multiplication and division problems, estimate answers and use technology to check calculations. They will solve problems using their understanding of the connection between multiplication and division and use this knowledge to solve balanced equations.

For Measurement and Geometry, students will learn how to measure the length, perimeter and area of objects. They will further their understanding of 2D shapes and 3D objects and describe the similarities and differences between these as well as splitting 2D shapes to create new shapes .

In Statistics and Probability, students will predict and record the outcomes of chance experiments, describe the possibility of everyday events and order their chances of occurring from least likely to most likely. They will identify everyday events, where one cannot happen if the other happens and identify events where the chance of one will not be affected by the occurrence of the other. Students will pose a survey question, collect data and display it in tables and graphs. They will read, compare, analyse, interpret and answer questions about data.

Year 3 MATHEMATICS

What better way to start a new term than with some multiplication and division! We will be diving into our 'times tables', especially the 3, 4, 5 and 10 times tables. So, get those tables posters up around the house; on your bedroom wall, on the back of the bathroom door, whatever it takes! We will also be looking at the different ways of representing multiplication and division, such as with number sentences, diagrams and even arrays. Now, if that wasn't enough, we will be getting into fractions! Did you know that the word "fraction" comes from the Latin word "fractus", which means "broken?" Can you work out why? We all know kids can't get enough of fractions, so we will be learning about halves, thirds, quarters and more. Maybe this term kids can convince parents to buy pizza for dinner just so you can practise your fractions? In fact, maybe you could make your own pizza at home and use the measurement skills we will be developing this term. We will be learning about the metric units used to measure everyday items. Wow, it certainly looks like a delicious term ahead in Maths!!

INQUIRY MIDDLES

History : First Australians This term students will be exploring First Australians. They will explain how and why life changed in the past and identify aspects that have remained the same. Students will describe experiences and perspectives of an individual group over time, learning about the diversity of the first people of Victoria, emphasising the relationship between country and culture. They will recognise the significant events that brought about change throughout our history and sequence these into chronological order.

Golly gosh! Half a year has flown by in the blink of an eye and here we are into Semester 2!

Classrooms open at 8:35am each morning for students to organise themselves for the day so that learning time can start promptly at 8:45am. We love it when our students are ready for their learning, and this means coming to school daily with a fully charged iPad. We'll explore the rhythm of poetry, discovering how words, sounds, imagery, and patterns create mood and meaning in ballads, limericks, and free verse. Inspired by what we learn, students will then unleash their creativity by crafting their own original poems. After our immersive experience at Sovereign Hill Camp, we'll travel back in time through historical texts, biographies, and primary sources to uncover what life was really like on the goldfields during Victoria's early settlement. Students will bring history to life through a chosen presentation based on their research and discoveries.

MATHEMATICS

This term in Mathematics, get ready to dive into the learning pit as we tackle the challenging and exciting world of Fractions, Decimals and Percentages! Students will become familiar with equivalent fractions, how to find common denominators, and confidently add and subtract fractions. They'll crack the code on how to convert between fractions, decimals, and percentages, making real-world connections along the way. Through hands-on investigations and problem-solving tasks, we'll be using the CUBES strategy and deep reasoning to conquer complex worded problems and explore open-ended maths challenges. This unit will stretch our thinking, build resilience, and grow our mathematical mindsets as we become confident, curious and capable problem solvers.

VISUAL ARTS:

Term 3 here we go! New little artists are coming into the art room this semester where we model and practise the Kingsley Park values, discuss what this looks like in the art room as well as encouraging creativity, courage and curiosity.

Preps

Prep students finally begin their Visual Arts journey, though many of them have been enjoying Art Club in Semester 1 and making themselves familiar with our creative space. Our theme for Term 3 is 'Underwater World' where they will be immersed in the colours and textures of underwater life. We will be using picture story books and artists such as Ken Done to inspire our artworks which will involve playing with different mark making mediums to create lines and patterns, working with air dry clay to make sculptures and experimenting with paper construction techniques.









Juniors

The Juniors will also be looking at what's under the water with their 'Fantastic Fish' unit, exploring printing, painting and drawing techniques with a focus on fluro (so much alliteration!). We look at warm and cool colours and the element of light (yep, just like in STEM) and how that affects the colours we use in our artworks as we prepare for a spectacular exhibition of our work later in the year.



Foundation and Year 2 STEM

In Term 3 STEM the Foundation and Year 2 students will be investigating 'flight' to build different flying objects. They will use their Mathematical skills to measure the height and distance that these flying objects travel. The Preps and Year 2s will also be exploring Science principles such as; the way objects move will depend on a variety of factors including their size and shape and how a push or a pull affects how an object moves or changes shape. During these STEM lessons the Foundation students will be making predictions and recording their observations in a variety of different ways.

Yr 1 STEM

This term in STEM, our Year 1 students will be investigating the fascinating topic of light and sound—how they are produced and how we sense them. They will explore the five senses and how they help us understand the world. They'll learn that the Sun is a natural source of light, and discover that we can only see objects when there is light to illuminate them. The Year 1s will also have fun experimenting with how sound is made by striking, blowing, scraping or shaking everyday materials. Throughout the unit, the students will be developing their scientific skills by posing questions, making predictions, and recording observations during hands-on investigations.

In Performing Arts this term, the Middle students will explore how to keep the beat, follow rhythms and create their own compositions. Through media clips, they will reflect on how music makes them feel and how instruments tell stories. They will participate in bucket drumming, where they will focus on technique, patterns, and synchronicity. They will also learn how to strum and play simple songs on the ukulele, using the chords C, F, G and Am.

In Term 3, Senior students will explore musical styles like classical, Indigenous, pop, and rock. They will analyse media clips, create percussion accompaniments, and compose rhythmic patterns. Year 5 students will use small bouncy balls, to create percussive sounds through bouncing, slapping, tapping, rolling, and synchronized movement. Year 6 students will explore writing lyrics to accompany a song and use media devices to compose music, exploring a variety of instrumental choices, rhythms and beats.

Foundation

This term, our Foundation students will begin their exciting journey into learning Australian Sign Language (Auslan)! For many of our students, this will be their very first experience with signing, so we'll be starting with the basics and learning together each week.

Throughout Term 3, students will explore when and where Auslan is used in the community and begin learning everyday signs. We'll focus on greetings such as hello, goodbye, good morning, good afternoon, how are you?, as well as polite expressions like please, thank you, yes, and no. As the term progresses, we'll expand our vocabulary to include colours and family members.

Keep an eye out during school assemblies—you might see students using Auslan applause or even performing a song using their new signing skills!

Juniors

I'm thrilled to be back working with our Junior students this year, especially after the incredible progress they made in Semester 1 last year! Since it's been about 12 months since their last Auslan lessons, this term we will focus on revising key topics to refresh their skills and confidence. Students will revisit signs related to what Auslan is, as well as greetings, colours, family members, shapes, foods, numbers, and animals. In addition to our revision, we'll also begin learning to fingerspell—an exciting step that will allow students to start signing their own names. This term, we'll also explore the similarities and differences between how we communicate in English and Auslan, helping students better understand the unique features of signed languages and how they can be used in everyday interactions.




